Our school regards attendance and punctuality of pupils as a priority, with a view to encouraging high attendance rates and avoiding concerning levels of absence. **We recognise that for any pupil to meet their full potential academically, a high level of attendance is crucial.** Our current attendance percentage is 94.8%.

Please ensure your child arrives on time for school. Children who are late miss important information during registration including the plan for the day and early morning work where they are practising key skills.

Gates open at **8.30am and close at 8:45am.** Late arrivals will be admitted via the school office. Please be aware that Springfield Junior School's **registers close at 9:00am.** Any pupil who has not registered in class by this time will be marked as an **unauthorised absence**.
